Alternatively, feel free to send an email to the school address, and it will be forwarded to the relevant staff member as needed.



















<u>Uniform</u>

A reminder to parents of the need for all students to wear full school uniforms every day. At times, a few students have been wearing sports shoes to school which is in breach of our uniform policy. School shoes need to be black leather. This is a Departmental policy due to WHS requirements for our school site. Please do not let your child wear incorrect footwear to school. Sports uniform is only to be worn on Tuesdays. For PE, students change at school. Uniforms can be purchased from the uniform shop. Students who are out of uniform MUST bring a note signed by their parents. Students who do not bring a note will be placed on lunchtime detention. Failure to attend, or frequent detentions for non-compliance may result in further consequences.

Further to this, we have introduced girls' shorts as part of the school uniform, and this is now available in the Uniform shop. Please be reminded that the only girls short that will be accepted should be purchased from the Uniform shop.



Punctuality to school

Every student has the responsibility to attend school every day it is open for instruction. Every schooling moment counts towards learning as it contributes to attaining knowledge and understanding, as well as linking concepts across subjects and content to develop a variety of skills essential in life. Schooling also contributes to the social and emotional development of young people to enable them to manage complex situations and relationships.

At KNHS we want to prepare our students to be reliable, responsible citizens who are accountable in the workforce. Understanding the importance of being punctual for work, meetings and appointments and the impact and/or consequences of not meeting these requirements is necessary for students. This is why a policy is being introduced for students to improve their ability to arrive on time at school each day. \cdot Students are required to be at school by 8:55am.

 \cdot Students who have two unexplained lates to school in a week will be attending an after-school reflection the following week on a Wednesday afternoon.

We hope with this policy in place that students manage their time and themselves better to ensure they arrive to school before their first lesson. This includes applying routines such as preparing their school bag and uniform the evening before, establishing a consistent bedtime and wake up time that provides adequate rest and sufficient time to get ready in the morning and to travel to school in time.



Mobile Phone Policy

Students at Kingsgrove North High School need to be commended on their efforts in adhering to the Mobile Phone Policy introduced Day 1 Term 4.

The overwhelming majority of students have ensured mobile devices are off and away and out of sight throughout the school day. We have noticed a noisier playground with a lot more movement and activity, students positively interacting with one another.

A reminder when a text is received for a second mobile phone breach, only parents and/or guardians are able to collect the phone at the end of the school day.






Organisation is Key

A highly organised student is ready to learn every day. Being organised enables students to produce their best by having the correct equipment for lessons, completing and submitting work on time and managing their workload, which reduces stress levels.

The school provides each student with a diary and a planner which are essential aids to remember deadlines and stay organised. Student diaries should be used to remind students of homework needing to be completed and ensure payments and events are noted and not forgotten.

Organisational skills include preparing for the school day the night before. This includes setting out your uniform ready to be worn and identifying if there is an issue which could be rectified through cleaning or attaining a note to provide at school. Preparing your bag, which includes putting in the necessary books and equipment needed for lessons, as well as preparing your meals for the day. These few minutes spent will remove the stress and rush in the morning that can lead to forgetting something.

Being organised leads to an individual developing to be a reliable, punctual and highly valued member of any team or organisation.



Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality
 and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- · being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.



MODELLING Club



Our latest model has now been completed which depicts the **Battle of Rourke's Drift** in the Zulu War. This iconic defence on 22nd January 1879 of the mission station in Natal by a small force of British and colonial troops against a huge force of Zulus who attacked the small British garrison. The Zulus was eventually repelled after more than 12 hours of bitter fighting with British forces winning a record number of Victoria Crosses. This diorama is now available to be viewed in the school library.

This year the club has decided to work on a major task which will require a large team effort to complete. The diorama "Pegasus Bridge" is currently under construction.

On 6 June 1944, during the Second World War the bridge was, along with the nearby Ranville Bridge over the Orne River, the objective of members of D Company, 2nd (Airborne) Battalion, Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry, a glider-borne force who were part of the 6th Airborne Division during Operation Tonga in the opening minutes of the Allied invasion of Normandy. The successful capture of the bridges played a significant role in limiting the effectiveness of a German counterattack in the aftermath of the D-Day Normandy invasion.

KNHS currently has 930 students which is a slight drop in the expected enrolments but there will be 30 international students joining later this year. The school intake boundaries will change in 2025 and these will further be affected by the reclassing of some schools in the surrounding areas that are currently single sex only. There is good news for families with younger siblings that are not yet high school age, siblings will now be automatically accepted into the high school if older siblings attend.

Mr Stasos is working closely with local First Nations Elders around the design and instalment of a Yarning Circle. There will be light towers installed on the oval in April which will enable the school to hire out the facility after hours.

Female students at KNHS will now have the option to wear navy tailored shorts as an alternate option to the skirts. These shorts are now available for purchase from the uniform shop. More shorts can be ordered as supply demands.

The school will also investigate the option of long sleeve blouses for girls as an alternate option to the current short sleeve.

Mr Kennedy, Relieving Deputy Principal, gave an insight into the Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP) for 2024-2027. The Department of Education mandates the first Growth & Attainment goal, Literacy & Numeracy, but the school chooses the other two, Academic Writing and Student Pathways (which looks at life after school with pathways other than university, attendance, and engagement) KNHS is currently scoring above the state and significant other school standards in writing but has a little way to go in numeracy and literacy. The policy for the SIP needs to be signed off by the end of Term 1. There will be a special P&C meeting called later this term to allow parents to review before it is finalised.

Mr Stefanis, Deputy Principal, introduced parents to the new Punctuality Policy that is now in effect at school. Continued lateness for school and class has an impact on a student's learning and is disruptive for teachers and other students in that class. Students must be at school by 8.55am. If students have two unexplained lates to school in a week they will attend an after school reflection on Wednesday until 3pm. If there are two unexplained lates a second time, the afterschool reflection will extend to 3.30pm.

The introduction of a warning bell near the end of break times has proven to be effective this year in helping students arrive at class after breaks on time.
