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# **Principal's Report**

We are over halfway through the term and year 12 are about to complete their final term at school. They have completed their HSC trials and should now be focusing on the remaining few weeks of school. As we go to print we are preparing the process to vote for and elect our new school leadership team for 2020 with the investiture to take place during week 8.

The term like always has been a busy one to date with the recent very successful Showcase that involved six neighbouring schools this year. The evening has continued to grow over the past 4 years and seems to be getting bigger and bigger. We also had performances at the recent China Day at Hurstville and several performances at the Opera House.

We also recently had the ABCN goals program launch which was held in the library and café. This program involves 20 year 9 students who will work with mentors from the following companies: Microsoft, Xerox and CSR, over the next term to develop leadership skills. Thank you to Ms Vourdousi and her team for catering for the launch which as always was a special event.





Our reputation for hosting study tours has continued and this term we hosted two tours in consecutive weeks with schools in China visiting and spending the week and experiencing what we have to offer. I would like to acknowledge and thank Ms Baker and Ms Chegwidden for all the work they do with the international program. Special thanks to all staff that worked before and during the Showcase to make it a very successful evening, and I would like to mention the CAPA staff in particular Ms Noulas for coordinating the event and being the driving force over the past 4 years.

Work has commenced on the drainage problem that we have when it rains heavy with the PE area flooding as well as the hall. This work is long overdue and has commenced with the first stage already completed with a new curb constructed near the new indoor soccer court. The second stage will commence straight after the multicultural day in week 6 and around the hall which is expected to take about a week. The final stage is the PE area which will involve the installation of new drain pits and water pipes. It will mean a good part of the area will be dug up and will probably extend into the Frenchs Forest area. This work may take up to a month but when completed should take away any future flooding.

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We have also started production for our new video promotion and the 360-degree virtual reality clips that will highlight main focal points around the school and be on the website. The new bus shelter and security fence have been completed along with the pergola and we are eagerly waiting for the minibus to arrive sometime in September, which will be a welcome whole school resource for the school.

Finally, we have set a date for the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary open day for Saturday December 7. Planning has commenced and will involve the following: a huge display in the library of past items; photos and any historical memorabilia; tours of the school at specific times during the day; and the quad will have a variety of information and food booths and student performances. More information to follow as we get closer to the day.

I look forward to the new leadership for 2020 taking over as we get to the end of the term and to the graduation ceremony which promises to be a special day along with the formal dinner later that evening.


