#### **KNHS Mobile Phone Policy 2023**

Mobile phones (and all similar electronic devices that play music or have apps/games on them) are highly popular and are used by students for a variety of purposes. Kingsgrove North High School understands there are identified times when mobile phones are beneficial in an educational setting, but we also understand there are times when the use of mobile phones become problematic. Research has shown that inappropriate use of mobile phones in schools has a negative impact on student learning. At Kingsgrove North High school we have seen a dramatic increase in misuse and problematic behaviour with student use of mobile phones and therefore we will be implementing a new policy commencing day one of 2023. #### Use of Mobile Phones and Devices in Class

With teacher direction and permission, devices may be used as a tool for learning in a class activity ONLY.

Parents and Carers should be regularly discussing safe and appropriate use of mobile phones with their child or children. #### Acceptable and Responsible Use

#### Being Respectful, Responsible and Safe

All of our school values are expectations not only for lessons but also during breaks. To demonstrate *Responsibility* in the playground, students must act safely by following all school rules and staff directions. We encourage parents to discuss how their child spends recess and lunch, while reinforcing our 'Hands-Off' rule. As a reminder to our school community, this rule is purely about maintaining safety; as such, chasing games, tackle or wrestling games, and 'play' fighting are not acceptable, as these kinds of games may accidentally cause injury to another, or cause an escalation of emotions and aggressive behaviour. 
### From the Library

#### Bullying

Bullying is an ongoing and deliberate misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that intends to cause physical, social and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power, or perceived power, over one or more persons who feel unable to stop it from happening.

Bullying can happen in person or online, via various digital platforms and devices and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert). Bullying behaviour is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time (for example, through sharing of digital records). Bullying of any form or for any reason can have immediate, medium and long-term effects on those involved, including bystanders.

What bullying is not

- single episodes of social rejection or dislike
- single episode acts of nastiness or spite
- random acts of aggression or intimidation
- mutual arguments, disagreements or fights.

These actions can cause great distress. However, they do not fit the definition of bullying and they're not examples of bullying unless someone is deliberately and repeatedly doing them. These examples are from the National Centre Against Bullying.

Our school will work with students to address both bullying and 'not bullying' . Please contact the school if you or your child have concerns.

### STUDENT LEARNING AND SUPPORT NEWS

#### After School Covid Tutoring

The After school Tutoring Program has been a positive and successful initiative at Kingsgrove North High School. This tutoring service was provided by the school, using a self-referral system. Students and parents would contact the Learning and Support staff and request for a short-term tutoring session or a more long-term commitment in their areas of need. Students and teachers committed their time to attending up to 3 afternoon sessions weekly, to assist students in improving their literacy and numeracy skills in their respective KLA areas. Between Term 1 and Term 3 in 2022, the After School Tutoring Program witnessed a 3-fold increase. Feedback received indicates that parents and students would like this service to continue in the future.



Planning has commenced for the continuation of the Afterschool Tutoring Program for 2023 during Semester 1. In 2023, there will be a student self-referral system where the students request tutoring in their literacy/ numeracy development. Furthermore, parents will be able to email the school and request tutoring from the Learning and Support team for their child.

Remember that Mathematics is a continuum, and all work is vital as a steppingstone to the next stage.



### CAPA NEWS

This term, Year 7 Visual Arts have been finishing their 'Fantastic Animals' topic. This has included creating a 'Pen Monster' using only Biro pens and specific pen characteristics for detailing. As well as this, they have been planning for and creating a Foamboard Print of an Australian animal of their choosing. Students have been working well towards completing their final assessment, and we can't wait to see them in Visual Arts next year! Year 7 Music students have been learning about orchestra instruments during Term 3. In Term 4 students are learning in the topic of Australian Aboriginal music and completing their digital quiz Assessment through Google Forms.

Year 8 Visual Arts students have been continuing their 'Australian Stories' topic and using Adobe Photoshop. They have learnt to create a 'Graphics Interchange Format' image, more commonly known as a 'GIF'. Students centred their digital GIF images around the 'Australian Stories' topic, with Qantas planes, jars of Vegemite, kangaroos, and more iconic Australian elements moving about in their images. Alongside this, they have studied the Australian Artist Charles Blackman and his 'School Girl' series, creating their own 'School Girl' inspired works. Year 8 Visual Arts has worked very hard this term, and we look forward to seeing some of them in our CAPA electives next year. Stay creative Year 8! Year 8 Music students have been learning about Music technology during Term 3, exploring composition and digital music making. Students completed an assessment task based on Bandlab to compose their own version of a rock song. In Term 4 students are learning the topic of TV Film and multimedia, and in particular the sound source from the film.



### CAPA NEWS

Year 9 Visual Design students have focused on 'Advertisement and Product Design' this term. Students have been looking at the concept of 'environmental design' and how it can be used as an advertising tool, whether it be intentional or subtle. Year 9 have not only completed a business model and design situation for an imaginary reusable product company, but have also designed their own logo for a reusable water bottle, which has been dye sublimated onto a real water bottle that the students get to keep a lovely memento of their first year undertaking Visual Design. We cannot wait to see what they come up with in Year 10!



Year 9 Photography and Digital Media have explored Still Life photography. Students investigated well known photographer Robyn Stacey and created an educational Gallery Pamphlet.
