PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Welcome back to 2023, I would like to take this opportunity to welcome our new Year 7 students along with several staff that are with us for the first time. Mr Tony Bui has been appointed to the Mathematics Faculty, Ms Marianna Brigden has been appointed as Head Teacher Teaching and Learning and as a result we will be advertising for a Head Teacher HSIE during this term. Mr Jason Wen has also been appointed to the Mathematics Faculty. Ms Hannah Reid was also appointed to the English faculty via the merit system.

During the holidays new roofs were installed to replace the old tiles that have been there since 1959. All work was carried out during the break, and this has resulted in no disruption to the normal school day. We have been given approval to have the walkways replaced as well as the roof over G block. This work is due to start in the next few weeks.



Further to this, there has been a program to repair all the windows that were not working properly and most of this work has also been completed along with the painting of all stairwells. The trade training facility in the Industrial Technology area has also been extended.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



One of the last big projects that we are planning on completing this year is the upgrade of the school hall. While we already have up to date lighting and lazer lights for performances as well as cameras to do live streaming, we are hoping to have air conditioning installed as well as sound panels to make the hall less noisy. We have also applied to council to have light towers installed on the oval and that is currently in progress and may take some time for approval.



A vertical garden was built and has enhanced the main entrance to the school.

The school has continued to grow and is fast approaching full capacity. At this stage we have 950 students enrolled at our school and that is expected to grow close to 1000 in 2024 when the capacity of the school will be reached.

While the threat of covid is still very real as a school we are now back to a normal school year with all planned activities going ahead and in many ways we are trying to make up for lost time over the past few years. Planned activities that will go ahead this year also include the COS showcase, COS band concert, multicultural day and the information evenings for Years 8 and 10 in term 2.

We recently held our annual open night with over 500 parents and potential students visiting the school. The school is looking great, and it was the perfect opportunity for our staff to highlight the many facilities that the school has to offer. My thanks to Ms Noulas for organizing the evening and all staff that supported the evening. Special thanks to our prefect leaders and the SRC who conducted the tours for parents and students.

Years 9 and 10

It has been a very busy start to the year with the Year 9 students experiencing their first taste of elective classes. Many of the students have settled into their new timetables and are enjoying their chosen specialty subject courses. Well done on approaching your learning with maturity and dedication.

As we prepare for the Year 9 student Naplan testing in the next couple of weeks, I would like to wish them well and look forward to reflecting on their results. Please note that attendance and participation in the Naplan testing is expected. If students are sick please inform the front office of their absence on the day.

Students in Year 10 have begun their ROSA journey and it is important that they focus on meeting all course outcomes through completing coursework, assessments and attendance of all lessons. Students are reminded that if they are needing additional support with their learning that Thursday's homework centre is in operation from 3.15pm to 4.30pm.

During Term 2, our Year 10 students will commence their Minimum Standards testing in reading, writing and numeracy. The online testing will be administered at school and students will be given information about this testing closer to the dates.

As we finalise Term 1 learning at Kingsgrove North High School, we would like to remind our Year 9 and 10 students of our expectations regarding behaviour and attendance. We encourage all students to attend school each day and attend their designated classes to achieve success. Along with this, we are working with students and the wider community to create a safe, inclusive and respectful environment for all.

School Uniform

This is a timely reminder to parents of the need for all students to wear full school uniforms. Some students have been wearing runners to school which is in breach of our uniform policy. School shoes need to be black leather. This is a Departmental policy due to WHS requirements for our school site. Please do not let your child wear incorrect footwear to school. Sports uniform is only to be worn on Tuesdays. For PE, students change at school. Uniforms can be purchased from the uniform shop. Students who are out of uniform MUST bring a note signed from their parents. Students who do not bring a note will be placed on a lunch time detention. Failure to attend, or frequent detentions for non-compliance may result in further consequences.

St Albans Road and Student Safety

The busiest times for St Albans Road are at the start and end of the school day. The most important priority for us is that students are safe as they enter and leave the school. Parents please note that the School Zone 40km/h is in operation from 8:00am to 9:30am in the morning and from 2:30pm to 4:00pm in the afternoon, and that council rangers have been active in the area. Please ensure you follow the road rules and speed limits at all times. Students are also frequently putting their lives at risk by ignoring basic safety instructions and crossing the road through the busy morning and afternoon traffic. Can you please encourage your child to cross at the lights or at the pedestrian crossing. Your ongoing support is most appreciated.

- to be out of sight (in bag or pocket) for the entire lesson.


Olympians Unleashed: (Tuesday 28th March)

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VET NEWS



The Benefits of Studying a VET Course

Vocational Education and Training (VET) refers to education and training that focuses on delivering skills and knowledge required for specific industries. It is a learning option for young people in the senior phase of learning. The role VET courses play in helping students prepare for further education, training, employment and lifelong learning is widely recognised by key stakeholders in education.

For NSW school students in Years 10–12 VET is 'dual accredited'. Students receive recognition towards their school qualification (Record of School Achievement or HSC), as well as a nationally recognised VET qualification (Certificate or Statement of Attainment).

The other benefits of participating in VET include (but are not limited to):

- obtaining practical experience from work
- gaining familiarity on how workplaces operate
- developing employability skills
- developing and improving interpersonal skills
- allowing students to explore the potential career path they would like to pursue.



Course Fes and Uniform Requirements

VET course fees cover the cost of consumables such as food ingredients used in Hospitality and other necessary resources for practical lessons. We try to keep costs as low as possible and at the same time make the projects interesting. We therefore would appreciate prompt payment of these fees to allow us to meet our costs.

Some courses such as Hospitality, Construction and Manufacturing & Engineering also have specific uniform and personal protection equipment (PPE) requirements as stipulated by industry standards. Students will be required to wear enclosed leather footwear and uniforms during all practical lessons and during work placement. Further information is available from your teacher or by contacting me.

VET NEWS



Unique Student Identifier (USI)

All students undertaking a VET program must have a Unique Student Identifier (USI). The Unique Student Identifier or USI is a reference number made up of 10 numbers and letters that:

- creates a secure online record of your recognised training and qualifications gained in Australia, even from different training organisations
- will give you access to your training records and transcripts
- can be accessed online, anytime and anywhere
- is free and easy to create and
- stays with you for life

A Registered Training Organisation cannot issue a student with a credential unless the student has provided them with their USI. To create a USI, students should visit the website below. They will require a form of identification such as their Medicare card to complete the registration form. Once completed, the student will receive an email confirming their USI. It is recommended that students use their Department of Education email account. Students will then need to enter their USI number onto the Student VET Induction page on Evidence Central. Please see your VET teacher or Mr. Smith if you have any queries.

Work Placement

Workplace learning programs form part of the NSW secondary school curriculum. They enable students to spend a planned period of time in a workplace which enhances their classroom learning by building on their industry skills. **Work placement is compulsory for Stage 6 VET courses. This is a NESA requirement.** Non-completion of work placement may result in a student being issued with an "N" determination for that course.

The minimum hours of work placement you are required to complete is 35 hours of work placement for every 120 hours of the VET course. Students studying the 2 year, 240 hour course will therefore complete 70 hours which equates to two weeks work placement.

Dates for Work Placement 2023 are as follows: Hospitality Term 3 Week 3 (31 Jul - 4 Aug) Term 4 Week 3 (23 Oct - 27 Oct) Construction Term 2 Week 8 (12 Jun - 16 Jun) Term 4 Week 2 (16 Oct - 20 Oct

MATHS NEWS



Welcome to a new year at KNHS. Our Mathematics staff continues the tradition of being committed to the education of all students and ensuring they are all given the opportunity to not only excel but be inspired to continue to seek knowledge in the mathematics area.

Remember the Mathematics staff are approachable, and students are encouraged to ask their teacher questions, to clarify understanding, during recess and lunchtimes. The Homework Centre is also available to all students until 4.30 pm on a Thursday afternoon.

Welcome to our new teachers Mr Tony Bui and Ms Kay Bao Tran, replacing Ms Touma.

Welcome to all our new Year 7 students and the new enrolments in other years. I hope that over the holidays all students have checked that their calculator works or have purchased a new Casio fx82 plus II calculator. Having a Casio means that only one set of instructions are necessary in class. The calculator is a mandatory piece of equipment, along with their rulers, and black pens. Students need more than one pen in their pencil case, especially for exams.

Year 7 and 9 are reminded that they need to know their tables as they still must sit for Naplan exams in Year 7 and 9. All the Naplan exams will be online including the use of online calculators.

All students now have access to practice Numeracy papers on their Mathematics class Google classroom and all students have been given a link to have access to draft Naplan papers to familiarise themselves with the format.

CAPA NEWS



CAPA students and teachers have settled in wonderfully to our classes for 2023, with exciting content being taught, excursions planned and a term full of events and creativity to blossom!

Year 7 Visual Arts students have now transitioned into their classes and have begun exploring the topics of 'Introduction to Art' and 'Portraiture' with year 8 Visual Arts beginning their study on 'Still Life' focusing on drawing technique, with particular focus on shading, tone and creating dimension within their drawings.







Year 7 Music students are learning about "The Simpsons" tune on the keyboard this term. They are developing their recognition of music symbols and notes. They are preparing their composition skills for their in class test in Week 10. Year 8 Music students are learning about "The Guitar" this term. They are developing their practical skills by learning to play a short riff on the guitar, some open chords to play the 12 Bar Blues and learning about different performing techniques and sounds in preparation for a listening test in Week 10.

Our stage 5 students have begun their elective classes within CAPA. Year 9 Music students are collaborating with one another in small groups in preparation for their performance assessment. They are also developing their skills in reading and writing musical notation. Students in Year 9 Visual Design have been introduced to the elements and principles of design, which they will apply innovatively throughout the course. Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator are being used by students to explore typography as part of their first assessment task: "Around the world postcards". Year 9 Photography and Digital Media students have begun exploring the elements and principles of photography. Utilizing compositional techniques and angles, they have been taking photos around school using their theoretical knowledge of the elements and principles.

Year 10 Visual Arts students have been introduced to their first topic of the year, German Expressionism. They have been exploring artists who delve into art movement and have begun working on their German Expressionist inspired portraits. Students utilised our CAPA digital studio to capture their emotive photographs and are now in the process of digitally manipulating on Photoshop before creating a lino print. Watch this space to see the wonderful art our students will be producing! Year 10 PDM students have been exploring the topic Signs, Symbols and Logos. Students have focused on experimenting with Photoshop to create their own typography for their upcoming Assessment Task where they will be creating their very own Film company logo. We are very excited to see the amazing logos that our students are going to create.

Year 10 Visual Design students are becoming their own educators! Students are exploring the world of educational videos, inspired by the popularity of digital art and installations like 'Van Gogh Alive' and 'Frida Kahlo: The Life of an Icon'. This term students have chosen a targeted artist that our KNHS Year 7 and 8 students are taught about. Their goal is to create an exciting and educational video about their chosen artist. Students are researching, preparing storyboards and creating voice-overs for their videos in hopes to have them shared with the junior years.



Several parents have raised concerns on the lack of air conditioning in some parts of the school. Although air conditioning has been provided in some of the hottest rooms and specialised spaces, it is not installed throughout all classrooms. To install air conditioning throughout the rest of the school it is approximately \$300,000 which is money the school doesn't have.

What issues are important to us?

Our recent meeting raised several issues that are of concern to parents within the school community. Here we look at these issues and how the P&C can support the school

Safety crossing

The safety of the students crossing St Albans Rd to enter the school at the main gates is an ongoing concern as there have been various near misses with cars. Students tend to stream in and out of the school across the road by the school gates rather then walk up to the intersection at Kingsgrove Rd or down to the pedestrian crossing on St Albans Rd.

The school has reached out to Canterbury Bankstown council numerous times to have a pedestrian crossing installed in front of the school, but it has fallen on deaf ears.

What can the P&C do? Write a letter. Parents can write to Canterbury Bankstown council requesting a pedestrian crossing to be installed in front of the school. You can mention your concern as a parent for the safety of students crossing the road to cross into the school gates. Petition. Have you lead a petition before or are quite a wordsmith? We're looking for someone to lead an online petition that we can then send to council with hopefully hundreds of signatures requesting the crossing.

If you're able to help with a Petition or have a letter template that parents could use please email the P&C and let us know!

Help, we need an Auditor!

If you want to help the P&C out but don't have a lot of time this could be the role for you! We need someone to audit our annual accounts for the upcoming AGM. This is a one-off job, and you do not need to be a qualified accountant. You would be helping us meet our P&C requirements and would be fully supported by the treasurer.


