Principal's Report

As we come to the close of another year I would like to look back and reflect on some of the great

programs and events that have taken place this year. Before I do this, I would like to congratulate and acknowledge Ms Bilali who has been promoted to Principal at Bankstown Girls High School. Ms Bilali has for the past two years been relieving Deputy at Punchbowl Boys High School even though she has still been attached to our school. She has been a great asset for our school and made a major contribution to its success and we know she will continue to do this in her new role at Bankstown Girls.

This year the successes for our school have continued with the very pleasing HSC results that have recently come out. Our students have continued to work hard in several areas and this has been reflected across the community and with the feedback that I have been receiving.

Our major events this year have again been an outstanding success with the Open Night in February as well as the Showcase, COS band, Presentation Evening, Orientation Day to name a few.

Our students have again represented our school with pride and success and established an excellent reputation in the community and every time they have been on an excursion.

In terms of upgrades and new infrastructure this year I can report that over 98% of our school has now been painted both internally and externally. I am please to see staff upgrading their rooms and making the learning environment more inviting for students and this is the feedback that I have been receiving. We have installed new seating and more pergolas for shade, opened the STEM room and Technology centre as well as upgrading other computer rooms with new benches.

All classrooms have interactive boards for using technology in their teaching and as we go to print the new memorial garden is also about to be completed. The outdoor education area with the Greenhouse is up and running and a work station for students will be build during the holiday break. The new basketball courts have also been getting plenty of usage.

In the area of teaching and learning staff have been busy developing new programs and a lot of work has been done in the area of Professional Development for staff with an executive conference held in September that focused on Instructional Leadership.

Other programs include Wize Up, Girls day, Top Blokes, weekly drumming circles and life ready course. Our SRC and Prefects have also been active in organising activities and assisting with school events. We also had Padstow TAFE do some work for us during the year with the building of 2 new shelters for the oval.

There are many more projects planned for 2019 with some of these about to commence in the holidays. The back carpark will be asphalted, the indoor soccer court about to commence

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construction as well. New seating will be placed in the main quad and a mini grandstand with a cover built at the eastern side of the oval.

A new senior study area also developed in the library this is also underway, while each faculty will have a specialised room (focal point in the school for that faculty) developed as well. The upgrade of technology in each classroom will continue which will mean that every room in the school will have IT facilities. A new garden will also be developed at the front of the school with an Asian theme.

Finally, on November 30 we had a visit from the Deputy Secretary Mr Murat Dizdar who spent the morning visiting various classroom and talking to students. He was very impressed with our school and relayed this back to the Secretary of the Department Mr Mark Scott. It was an excellent endorsement of our school and the work that both staff and students do.

I would like to end by thanking my staff for all their hard work this year as well as the school executive and Deputies. I would also like to wish everyone a happy Christmas and a safe holiday break and I look forward to celebrating the schools 60th anniversary in 2019

"NO" she screams shaking her head as her tears fall onto my face.


"Claire pleas" I plead she looks me in the eyes "let me go" I say. She looks at me with horror. "You need to let me go and live your life." I croak.

Year 5/6 Orientation Day Programming in Javascript and Python with Mrs Cazouris

On Tuesday 4th December 2018 Mr Cazouris had the pleasure of introducing students to fun coding projects in javascript and Python. There were two groups from Bexley North Primary School and One Group from Mcallums Hill. The projects offered were Dance Party 1 and 2 from Code.Org and The Turtle Race from Code Club Australia.

Bexley North students learnt about the transition from block- based coding to text based coding and analysed the syntax, functions and variables from an example provided. Students now know what to look for when using text-based programming languages. Most students from Bexley North Primary School completed Dance Party 1 and 2 from code.org, received certificates and continued onto coding the Turtle Race in Python which is a text-based programming language. Students created their accounts in Trinket and have now the opportunity to continue programming in Python at their school or even at home.

Mcallums Hill students were introduced to Code.Org. They were so excited because they created their accounts and worked on block-based coding. The project was Dance Party. Students got to code sprites doing dance moves and learnt how to import variables, functions, measures and so on. This lesson made a big difference to these students as it opened a world of coding which they can take back to their school and continue. This will make their transitions to High School easier as they will be faced with Digital Technologies in year 7 and 8 where coding is a major part of.

All Students had lots of fun and were very thankful for their coding learning experience with Mrs Cazouris.


